## Criteria for Membership on the Pastor Nominating Committee

When the congregation's Nominating Committee begins considering prospective members of the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC), it should enter a prayerful process, seeking God's guidance for a good result. The PNC's work will do much to shape the congregation's life, for good or ill, for years to come.

You may wish to consider how to gather the information you're looking for. Getting names is the easy part – but how do you receive and evaluate evidence of a person's Christian life, or indications that the person has the gifts and abilities needed on the PNC? Some nominating committees interview prospective PNC members; others ask for a letter or statement from each one – perhaps as simple as responding to the question, "Why do you want to serve on the Pastor Nominating Committee?"

One important way to discern the gifts and qualifications for prospective members of the PNC is to see how (or if) they participate in the Mission Study.

The selection of nominees is not an easy process. You're likely to know these people and be friends with them. Some of them want fervently to be on the PNC. And some of them may have to be passed over – for reasons of representation if not because of other criteria listed below. This is not a time to guard people's feelings at all costs; the future of the congregation's life, ministry, and faithfulness is at stake. This is a time for prayerful, careful discernment.

The following criteria should be published for the congregation: this is what you're looking for. The list should be available to those who submit their names or those who wish to suggest others. The criteria should be distributed again at the congregational meeting when the PNC is elected.

- Evidence of bearing the fruit of the spirit (Galatians 5:22-26). Spiritual maturity "trumps" strong opinions, long church activity, or a forceful personality. Clearly this requires a certain amount of discernment on the part of the committee, and it may seem by some as presumptuous. But the scripture enjoins us to use such discernment in selecting church leaders (Acts 6:3, for example), and the PNC itself will certainly have to examine potential pastors for signs of spiritual maturity and giftedness.
- Evidence of faithful participation in the life of the congregation in recent years, months and weeks. This doesn't mean that a person has to be an old-time member of the congregation. But someone who suddenly appears on the scene after an extended period of inactivity is probably not the best person to be on the PNC. You'll want to think twice about someone who "dropped out" because of dislike for the former pastor, who now wants to influence the selection of a new pastor. Again, this doesn't mean that everyone on the PNC has to have liked the former pastor, but those who remain faithful in the congregation regardless of how they feel about the pastor are most likely to serve faithfully in the PNC process.
- Evidence of faithful discipleship beyond Sunday morning worship. Worship, of course, is at the heart of the church's life. But if worship is the only expression of a person's Christian life, it may cast some doubts about the person's spiritual maturity, let alone his or her ability to grasp the full range of church programs and pastoral responsibilities.
- Evidence that the person understands, and is both willing and able, to invest the time and energy the PNC's work will require. This is a demanding responsibility. Consider the impact on the committee's work if it has members who have plans for extended absences during the next eighteen months or so; whose work schedule, health, or other factors preclude regular meetings that are fairly long and intense. Work between meetings is also demanding. The PNC's work requires a good deal of physical, spiritual and emotional energy.

- Ability to keep confidences. Confidentiality is an absolute requirement for this committee. Much damage has been done in some churches, and to some pastors, by PNC members who “just can’t resist” telling somebody about the prospective pastors they’re considering. The requirement of confidentiality means not telling anyone outside the PNC other than appropriate people at the Presbytery level – not even one’s spouse. People who can’t keep confidences don’t belong on the PNC.
- Ability to deal with disappointment and frustration. The PNC’s work is highly likely to have its ups and downs. The committee may find it difficult to agree on a pastor. Personality clashes are likely. The committee may decide unanimously on a pastor, only to have that person turn them down (in fact, in today’s environment, such a scenario is likely to repeat itself). The ability to deal with such frustration in a healthy manner is crucial.
- Ability to help build consensus. Presbytery policy requires a unanimous final decision by the PNC regarding their nomination of a pastor. (Other decisions do not have to be unanimous.) For the rationale behind this requirement, see “Covenants for Pastor Nominating Committees.” Consensus-building is not the same as compromise, although compromise may be involved. Persons who have such strong opinions that they cannot listen to differing viewpoints, or see the validity in the experience of others, probably have no place on the PNC. The committee would benefit if several of its members have a special talent for helping a group beyond individual opinions to a point of consensus.
- Ability to speak one’s mind, and to listen carefully to others. The “Covenants” paper refers to both speaking and listening. You’ll want members on the PNC who know when to speak, and when to keep quiet and listen. A healthy committee will have conflict. Its members will need the ability to speak carefully, but also to listen sensitively to each other.
- Representation. In addition to such factors as age, sex, and ethnic background, the PNC should also include various theological viewpoints consistent with the Reformed understanding of the Christian faith. It might also include a balance of personality types and opinions about evangelism and worship. This calls for a considered selection by the congregation’s Nominating Committee and careful attention by the congregation when the PNC is elected. This is one good reason for the nominating committee to look at the full slate of prospective nominees before telling anyone that he or she will be nominated.
- Willingness to abide by Presbytery’s “EEO” guidelines. A willingness to consider candidates without screening them for age, gender, race, disability, or other factors unrelated to a profession of faith or to pastoral gifts and skills, is essential. A person who is unwilling to consider candidates without such screening is ineligible for the PNC (G-14-0502b). The Information Form includes a place for the PNC to affirm its intention to consider candidates on a non-discriminatory basis.
- Prayerfulness. This is the heart of it. You’re not looking for pious display but for a Christian life, lived with integrity and undergirded with prayer. One evidence of a prayerful life is a willingness and openness to have one’s mind changed – to be interrupted and taught by God.

Notes from the Keys by Brandolyn Thran  
July 2017

*Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go. Joshua 1:9*  
*For the Spirit God gave us does not make us timid, but gives us power, love and self-discipline.*

2 Timothy 1:7

When I reflect on why I wanted to learn how to play the piano, playing in front of other people was not high on the “why” list. Once in high school I was “the piano player” for our church Christmas Program, and I remember the pressure to perform correctly stole the joy of playing, so I didn’t do *that* again...until...One day, about five years ago, I found my feet maneuvering me through the crowd at my new church in Fernley, NV and offering my gift to the very contemporary-band leader. It was an out-of-body experience, my Spirit moved me up to the front of that sanctuary that day, not my logical mind. I thought it was a pretty big step of faith when I was welcomed into the band as “keys”. However, between the electric guitars and percussion section, the piano was barely heard. The pressure was minimal so rocking out for God worked out well; no one could *really* hear me. It was safe.

When we started attending this church I heard the need for a pianist, but I kept my head down, I didn’t want to offer my gift; that would mean exposure and expectation. However, I found Spirit-self saying “I could do it”. In January, when I found myself in front of this congregation, ALL BY MYSELF, I felt very exposed and very vulnerable. After a minor freak-out and fighting the strong desire to duck-and-run, I focused on the fact that I am not the first person God has placed in very uncomfortable situations in order for growth to occur. Moses, Esther, Joshua, Paul, Peter, the list goes on and on; so why would I expect it to be any different in 2017? Silly me.

Once I accepted that the duck-and-run option was not viable, I started to pray that my playing would be “bold and courageous”. Bold and courageous; playing for God, not for people. Bold and courageous; to move people into worship, not a performance about Brandolyn. Bold and courageous; to learn what I needed to learn in the unknown, not run back to safety of the known. I know that both times my piano gift has been offered into service for others it has been my Spirit moving my feet and mouth. Left up to me, the very human me, I would keep my gift hidden in my own home, safe where mistakes are not heard and I’m not vulnerable to critics. But how does that bring glory to God?

As 2 Timothy 1:7 tells us, we are not to be timid because we have a Spirit of power, love, and self-discipline. That verse strips away all excuses for me. God expects us to move into the unknown in a bold and courageous fashion, not focusing on the vulnerability tied to fear and unknown, but focusing on the power He gives each one of us when we accept Him as our Savior. That known, the known that God goes before us, is with us and is for us, and that we have power, love and self-discipline should overpower any of our unknowns.

What are you not doing because the vulnerability seems too much? My hope is that you become more “bold and courageous” and move into your unknown with power, love and self-discipline.


