Tom's Corner

This month I am choosing to share a daily meditation by Ricahrd Rohr of Albuquerque, New Mexico. I do this part because of a sermon I preached recently on Faith and Doubt. I hope you enjoy this article and are challenged by it.

An Open and Growing Heart

Like “prayer,” “religion,” and so many other words, the word “faith” means different things to different people. As we recover the lost tradition of contemplation, here are some clarifications for what I mean by “faith” and why, understood in a non-dualistic way, faith is not blind assent, or even reasoned assent, but an essential part of spiritual transformation. Faith points to *an initial opening* of the heart or mind space from our side. Foundationally, this is all that faith is, but its effects and implications can be enormous. Faith is our small but necessary “yes” to any new change or encounter. Such an opening or re-opening is necessary to help you make fresh starts or break through to new levels. You normally have to let go of the old and go through a stage of unknowing or confusion before you can move to another level of awareness or new capacity. This opening up and letting go is largely what we mean by faith, and it explains why *doubt and faith are correlative terms*. People of great faith often suffer bouts of great doubt because they continue to grow. Mother Teresa experienced decades of doubt, as was widely reported after her death. The very fact that the media and people in general were surprised by her experience demonstrates our very limited understanding of faith. The movement through unknowing is necessary in all encounters, relationships, or intellectual breakthroughs, not just with the Divine. Human faith and religious faith are much the same except in their object or goal. What sets us on the wrong path was making the object of religious faith “ideas” or doctrines instead of a person. [1] Our faith is not a belief that dogmas or moral opinions are true, but a faith that Ultimate Reality/God/Jesus is accessible to us—and even on our side. Jesus was able to touch and heal people who trusted him as an emissary of God’s love, not people who assessed intellectual statements and decided whether they were true or false. Faith is more *how* to believe than *what* to believe.

Notes from the Keys by Brandolyn Thran August 2017

“Whoever conceals his transgressions will not prosper, but he who confesses and forsakes them will obtain mercy.” Proverbs 28:13

“If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.” 1 John 1:8-9

At the third Mission Study Meeting the group was openly sharing about how our church could “do church different” with the hopes of attracting new and younger attendees. The topic of our current order of service brought up a discussion regarding the Prayer of Confession.

For several weeks, I continued to ponder the discussion; my hope here is to help ‘defend’, for lack of a better word, the Prayer of Confession and maybe help others consider the importance of why we must look at the ugly side of us (sin) *before* we can step into grace (pardon) and the rest of the service.

From the logistical aspect of our service, it is very important to recognize, understand and internalize that the Prayer of Confession is immediately followed by the Assurance of Pardon. Therefore, while we do start the service focusing on sin and what we have done wrong, we don’t stay there, we quickly move to Pardon. This reflects the exact process that is required of redemption. We must repent first, to be redeemed. If we skip the repentance, we don’t get to be redeemed.

Trust me, I can fully appreciate the desire to skip the reflection part, to skip the part that requires me to get humble and admit to myself that I am a dirty rotten sinner. God already knows it, so it really isn’t a surprise to him, but to hear myself say it, ouch --- that hurts!!! The Prayer of Confession makes me look at myself and see that part of me that I don’t want to see, the parts that I work so hard to hide with my smile, nice clothes, a clean car, a good job...you know...all those earthly things we do. Yes, it is a smack in the face...like the lyrics from a favorite song “I’ve cussed on a Sunday, I’ve cheated and I’ve lied, I’ve fallen down from grace, A few too many times” (My Church by Maren Morris), the Prayer of Confession cuts to the core, quick! Granted, some Sunday’s the Prayer is more aligned with my struggles than others, but regardless, the important act of acknowledging that I am a sinner and the need to get humble before God is important. Then, and this is the beautiful thing that we sometimes forget to appreciate as much as we should, we don’t stay there, we don’t end the service there – we are allowed to self-reflect just a bit, so on those Sunday’s when we aren’t aligned with the written Prayer we can get our own two cents in, and then -- we are granted pardon!! Praise the Lord!!

If we removed the Prayer of Confession and the Assurance of Pardon, we would be denying ourselves the opportunity to get in our right place with God. We would be denying ourselves repentance and redemption! When (if) churches take away the very humbling acknowledgement of our human ways (sin), it runs the risk of becoming a “feel good church”.

Humility is required, albeit often uncomfortable; humility helps us silly humans remember to let God be God, and me be me. When we skip over humility, the confession of our sins and the acknowledgement that we require forgiveness, what might the consequences be? We must be careful to not only focus on the sin, the Confession, because it does not stand alone, it is followed by the Pardon; we don’t get to skip straight to grace. My hope is that we do not remove what makes us uncomfortable, but that we learn to step in to that sacred space of humility and witness the redeeming power of our Lord.
