Tom's Corner

I was at a loss as what to write about this time in the 'Desert Pulpit'. So I started thumbing through two magazines that I get each month. - 'The Christian Century' and 'Presbyterians Today'. And it was in 'Presbyterians Today' that I came across an article entitled 'Faith vs. Fear' that caught my eye. So I'll began by referencing two scriptures:

'When an alien resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the alien. The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself; for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God.' - Leviticus 19: 33-34

'Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it.' - **Hebrews** 13:2

So then to paraphrase what Vernon Boyles III said about our attitude and response to those foreigners in our midst needs to be this. That if we truly want to call ourselves followers of Jesus then our 'principle and practice' needs to be that of love and hospitality towards the alien and the stranger, instead of being fearful, racist, or demonstrating ungodly attacks against those we deem to be too different from ourselves. For all of humanity and creation are the works of God our Father and deserve our respect, love, and care.

During World War II Martin Niemoller of the German Confessing Church wrote this about the Nazi authoritarian rule that was sweeping across much of Europe at the time:

'First they came for the Socialist, and I did not speak out - because I was not a Socialist. Then they came for the Trade Unionist, and I did not speak out - because I was not a Trade Unionist. Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out - because I was not a Jew. The they came for me - and there was no one left to speak for me.'

As I said on Easter morning a few weeks ago, being one of his disciples is never an easy task. But because he is risen and we have nothing to fear he daily awaits our response.

Notes from the Keys by Brandolyn Thran May 2017

First and foremost, thank you to Bertha, Caren, Rev. Tom, the choir, and the congregation for the warm welcome onto the piano bench!! The grace and encouragement shown to me as I settle into my role as "the piano player" is gratefully appreciated. My hope and prayer for this column is that, like my piano playing, I can help move you into reflection and worship so you may grow in God.

Ever since I can remember I wanted to play the piano, and in fourth grade my parents directed my desire for music to band instruments; a flute was a lot cheaper and smaller! Being part of the school band was invigorating and I loved everything about it, but it still wasn't the piano, so I continued to ask about piano lessons. Quarter notes turned into half notes, which turned in years of whole notes and measures of rest, when one day in sixth grade I came home from school and my parents said, "It's time, let's go to Anchorage and pick out your piano." Little did I know, that during that long waiting period, they were preparing for the big purchase; my dream wasn't being denied, it was simply on hold, resting, until the time was right. Looking back, it's easy for me to find a parallel to faith, to the time God keeps us waiting, not because He isn't hearing, but because He is preparing us for the big reveal. Oh, you can imagine the excitement as we went to the piano store and I picked out the most beautiful piano ever! Dreams do come true, prayers are answered, but sometimes we must wait in the rests so that our big reveal is at just the right time.

This concept is confirmed several times in the Bible, and particularly in Isaiah, for it seems even back then, people had a hard time waiting on God and thought they had the right idea and rushed ahead. For example, Isaiah 26:1-3 "The path of righteous is level; you make level the way of the righteous. In the path of your judgements, O Lord, we wait for you; your name and remembrance are the desire of our soul. My soul yearns for you in the night; my spirit within me earnestly seeks you, for when your judgements are in the earth, the inhabitants of the world learn righteousness.". Walking in righteousness (meaning 'aligned with God') means waiting on God.

Likewise, in Isaiah 30:15 "For thus said the Lord God, the Holy One of Israel, "In returning and rest you shall be saved; In quietness and in trust shall be your strength." In rest, in the quiet, we are strong when we recognize (trust) in God.

Rest in life, and rest in music, tends to be an uncomfortable thing because we want to "jump back in" to the game of life and play our instrument loud and proud. We don't want to be left out in the quiet. However, in *our* quiet God is still working, the band is still playing, and when we come back in to the mix in-time and at the right time, marvelous things will unfold before us.

Prayer: Dear God, Help me to find quiet, comforting rest in You. I admit I tend to want to control and to skip the rest to get to "the good stuff", but remind me that in the quiet, in the rest, You are there preparing great things for me. Help me quench the "nagging" that I am missing out, and instead recognize the learnings that are occurring so when the time is right, and my rest is over, I am ready to step into Your big reveal. Amen.

Three meetings will be held: May 21 after church, June 4 after church and June 14, Wednesday, 6 to 6 p.m. Following this process, a Mission Statement will be developed for Elko First Presbyterian Church and the Pastor Nominating Committee will proceed to the pastoral search. (Ephesians 4)
