TOM'S CORNER:

Now that fall is upon us it shouldn't come as a surprise that the church is sending out its annual Stewardship letter. It is usually written in a manner that extols the virtues of giving, with a line or two of scripture to illustrate that point.

I am writing at this time to tell you that I pledge to the church each year for purely selfish reasons. I pledge because I want First Presbyterian Church to exist-and given your generosity, to thrive- because if it didn't there are so many things about it that I would miss dearly. I would miss having that time on Sunday morning that I can spend thinking about the holy, in a place I feel accepted and loved. I would miss the community of parishioners and friends that I have developed through this church, some of whom I only see at worship each Sunday or at churchsponsored events. I would miss the music that we experience together each Sunday and throughout the year. Now is the time to say, **this is my church family** and it is an ultimate priority. It is where I receive my spiritual nourishment. It is the place that challenges me to live beyond the voice of culture to a freer life of faith.

You are a congregation of generous people. May you give generously to the church's ministry and mission for next year as the (PNC) Pastor Nominating Committee has already started the process of securing and calling your next called pastor. As you give, may you know the joy of giving and the satisfaction of knowing what an important presence this church is in this community of Elko and the world.

On Sunday October 22nd I preached my first Stewardship sermon entitled – "*What is God asking of You*?" I'll be preaching two more Stewardship sermons on November 5th and 12th. On Sunday November 12th we will be receiving your pledge cards during worship that morning. On Sunday November 19th we will be celebrating our annual "Reaping of the Harvest" as a Thanksgiving 'potluck' meal after worship in the fellowship hall. I hope many of you plan on attending. Notes from the Keys by Brandolyn Thran October 2017

"Whatever is true, noble, right, pure, lovely, admirable, excellent, praiseworthy, think about such things." Phil 4:8

Playing the piano brings me so much joy. Practicing is my favorite, however "performing" on Sunday is just a necessary evil of the job. When I practice it is me and God, the music flows from my heart through my fingers and into my ears, and an indescribable joy is felt. The sound of the blending notes, the rhythm of the song, my breathing fluid with the music, and the movement of my fingers without really even thinking about it – it is heaven on earth! I find myself playing with abandoned recklessness and passion, and it is so much fun!

When I play on Sunday, however, it is me, God, and a whole lot of people! I find my hands shake, my breath is short and sometimes forgotten until it becomes a gasp, counting to 4 becomes challenging, and it feels less like heaven and more like being squashed. My ears hear the tension in my playing, a reduced volume, the tangling of my fingers and a measured attempt a solider would be proud of, to get it "right".

Then, the epiphany happened this 10th month of playing, sometimes a-ha moments are slow to materialize!! It donned on me at practice, wrong notes just float into the music and are part of the whole, but on Sunday wrong notes blare out so loud that they are all I remember; my focus moves from enjoying a gift to critical judgement.

Who else is guilty of this? Focusing on the wrong note – the wrong note that most people probably didn't even hear, the wrong note that was one of 99 right notes, the wrong note that didn't make a difference in the overall piece, the wrong note that just sucks up any joy like a vacuum? Focus on the wrong word spoken at the dinner table amid many compliments? Focus on the mistake made 20 years ago amid millions of good decisions? Focus on the one poor test score amid the many A's and B's? Focus on the one mistake amid the many atta-boys your supervisor gives you?

Focus is a choice; where we focus our attention is our choice. The Bible tells us in Philippians 4:8 where we are to focus, "*Whatever is true, noble, right, pure, lovely, admirable, excellent, praiseworthy, think about such things.*" Wrong notes, mean words, poor test scores, and mistakes are not what we are to focus on. We can certainly acknowledge them, because we do need to recognize where improvements can be made or learning needs to occur, but we don't FOCUS on them...there is a difference between acknowledgement and focus. According to the Oxford Dictionary acknowledgement is the "acceptance of the truth or existence of something" and focus is "the center of interest or activity". We need to accept we did something less than desirable, but we don't have to make it the center of our universe. We don't have to let the acknowledgement steal our focus from things that are true, noble, right, pure, lovely, admirable, and praiseworthy!

With my new awareness, my goal is to approach playing on Sunday more like practice, with more reckless abandon, and when I hit those wrong notes, because I will hit them, they will be loud and proud and acknowledged, but my focus will remain on the opportunity to serve God and the joy that brings.

My hope is that if you also struggle with joy-stealing moments, that you too will practice separating acknowledgement and focus, and find more joy today than you did yesterday.

Nevada Day—October 31

Carson City's Nevada Day parade and celebrations is among the oldest ongoing parade activities held in the Silver State, and, with the exception of Hawaii and West Virginia, is the only admission day activity of its kind in the country.

Regarding the inaugural parade in 1938, the Daily Appeal claimed the event was "Nevada's largest and best Admission Day celebration in the history of the state." Celebrating Nevada Day in Carson City is a long time-honored tradition, but the history on commemorating our statehood predates the 1938 parade by more than 60 years.

The eight-day birthday bash in the centennial year of 1964 was far and away a record-breaker. Tom Wilson, cofounder of Carson City's Nevada Day and chairman of the Centennial Commission, Governor Grant Sawyer had planned the event for three years. The Saturday parade with over 230 entries was three hours long, the longest up to that time (ironically, the typical length of a parade today). Governor Grant Sawyer presented "Adoption" plaques to the "Bonanza" cast and company including parade marshal Lorne Greene, Michael Landon, and Dan Blocker. An estimated 70,000 people watched the parade which was broadcast in its entirety by TV station KOLO in Reno and filmed by UPI crews for California stations. Since then, whenever October 31 has fallen on a Sunday, the parade has been held on Saturday, October 30 (1971, 1976, 1982, and 1993). In 1971, the law governing holidays was amended to designate Friday as the state holiday when October 31 falls on a Saturday.

The Nevada Day parade and celebration in Carson City has become a long-standing tradition and the Silver State's largest parade. It has witnessed Nevada's 75th, 100th, and 125th anniversaries. Now in our state's 137th year, conceivably the Nevada Day activities during the three day weekend will grow along with the fastest-growing state in the union, the fastest-growing metropolitan area in the country (Las Vegas) and our ever-growing capital city.

Elko's 29th annual **Nevada Day Parade** will be held at 11 a.m. Friday, Oct. 28. This year Nevada will be celebrating 152 years of statehood and the City of Elko will be celebrating its centennial in 2017. The Knights of Columbus Council 2511 and Assembly 614 announced that the parade theme this year is "*Elko Centennial: Keeping Traditions Strong for 100 Years and beyond.*"

Thank you for all your support of Heifer International! Your donations totaled \$2,363.00 and with the donations of \$236.00 made during VBS, we are able to send \$2,599.00 to Heifer. It takes \$1000 to provide an entire village with BioGas stoves. No longer will those villagers have to gather firewood by hand, depleting the soil and environment. No longer will those villagers have to breathe in the smoke that causes lung and eve diseases. In addition we will be able to send \$1500 for a Joy to the World Basket, which consists of two sheep, four goats, one heifer and two llamas. These animals will provide wool for blankets and clothing, sustain families with enough rich milk to feed dozens of people, and raise money for food, clothing, medicine and school tuition - and also provide manure for the BioGas stoves – which will produce fertilizer and methane gas. And one of the big reasons Heifer is worth our support during the Heifer Service each year is that each recipient of an animal has the responsibility and joy of Passing on the Gift of an offspring to another family.
