

Words

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, God said, "Let there be light."

In the beginning was the Word.

God spoke the world out of chaos into order. He spoke. God's words brought his intention into being. In the beginning the Word, the Logos, was there. God's Word – Jesus, the Logos, lived out God's intention as a human being.

Words are important for they express our intensions as well. The words we speak publicly, and even – or perhaps more importantly – privately – reveal who we are and how we view others.

Writing in Psychology Today, Jack Schafer Ph.D., writes: "Words cannot change reality, but they can change how people perceive reality. Words create filters through which people view the world around them."

April Michelle Davis, Executive Director of the National Association of Independent Writers & Editors said: "Words are the basis for communication, no matter the language spoken. In every aspect of life, personal or professional, words form the basis of relationships with others."

We are living in a time when many words (too many words?) are tossed around as if they have no impact on us or others. And yet, they DO impact not only others, but ourselves!

Scripture is clear about how important our words are and how we are to use our words. Jesus said, "I tell you, on the day of judgment you will have to give an account for every careless word you utter; for by your words you will be justified, and by your words you will be condemned." (Matt. 12:36-38)

Paul wrote of the important way in which we are to use our words: "Let no evil talk come out of your mouths, but only what is useful for building up, as there is need, so that your words may give grace to those who hear." (Eph. 4:29) "Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing." (1 Thess. 5:11)

In Matthew's gospel, Jesus teaches that "it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but it is what comes out of the mouth that defiles. . . what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander." (Matt. 15:11, 18-19)

Our attitudes and intensions are revealed in how we speak. The way we think and what we speak do have a real impact – on us, and those around us. Have you ever experienced "catching" a bad attitude from someone else? I have. I was a member of a choir and I thoroughly enjoyed it; it brought me joy. Then I began to ride to rehearsals with another singer who was unhappy about nearly everything to do with the choir. She spent the entire drive (45 minutes each way) complaining. I found that over the course of a few months my own attitude was impacted; my joy had nearly vanished. For my own well-being I stopped sharing the drive with her and in short order my enjoyment of the choir returned.

We can choose to hold a negative attitude which will almost certainly be expressed in the words we use. Or, we can rest in the truth that – whatever the situation – God is present and at work in his creation. By trusting the God who loves us and is always for us, we can "flip the switch." When we direct our thoughts toward the life-affirming words and work of God in Christ, we will have little room for the negative thoughts that lead to harmful words.

Let us be people of love and hope in the midst of a fractured world. Let us be bringers of "the words of eternal life."

Presbyterian Women! World Day of Prayer

Normally (what is normal?) the Presbyterian Women would be hosting other Elko churches on March 5th to celebrate the World Day of Prayer. This year the women of Vanuatu, an island nation in the South Pacific, have created a worship service focusing on the Bible story in Matthew 7:24-27. The terrain and the climate is crucial to them because the island is prone to earthquakes, cyclones, volcanic eruptions, and rising sea levels. In lieu of a collection to support the women of Vanuatu, PW will send a check from the amount you have contributed through the No Work Bazaar and yard/rummage sale.

The Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is the emergency and refugee program of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Our congregations partner to care for communities adversely affected by crisis and catastrophic events.

Wildfires roared through the Pacific Northwest in the fall of 2020. A PDA National Response Team member was deployed to assist the Presbytery of the Cascades, and to work with for the immediate need for housing.

Hurricane lota hit Nov. 2020 with 155 mph sustained winds in Nicaragua. Immediate support was realized through PDA with support for water, sanitation & hygiene (WASH). Long term support includes rebuilding efforts, livelihood programs and long term recovery needs.

Budgeting money is challenging. Please remember gifts to special funds/projects are not included as part of our pledged giving, but will be included with your financial statement of giving to the church.



To whom it may concern,

My name is JR Green. I am the director of a family services agency located in Reno. The name of the organization is Call To Compassion. One of the many services we offer is specialized family foster care.

Like other programs within a system of care approach, a fundamental assumption of treatment foster care is that the most effective treatment environment for a youth is his/her home, community, and school. Within this model, foster parents pay close attention to the youth's behavior on a daily basis and are in close communication with other members of the youth's treatment team in order to provide individualized, coordinated treatment (Fisher & Chamberlain, 2000). Treatment foster care is a "specialized" or "advanced" version of foster care in which foster parents are provided with additional training and support in order to provide specialized care and support to high-needs youth. Foster parents receive ongoing consultation and support so they are able to provide the best possible environment for the youth.

As you may already know, foster families are in high demand and there are hundreds of kids in specialized foster care, who are in need of a safe place they can call home. The rural areas of Nevada are especially in need of families. We have been in contact with the Department of Child and Family Services (DCFS) to assist with this need.
