Redemption

I love the movie "Apollo Thirteen." I have lost count of how many times I've watched it. It's a well-made film with excellent actors and a gripping story, but the reason I love it is because of the examples of redemption it shows us; how something "bad" is redeemed to provide the saving solution

Just as Jim Lovell's (Tom Hanks) team is about to blast off for the moon, the NASA doctors think Ken Mattingly (Gary Sinise) could possibly be coming down with German Measles and remove him from the crew. He is replaced by Jack Swigert (Kevin Bacon). A terrible disappointment for Mattingly, as well as his crewmates.

Of course, you will know that there is an explosion on board that has the potential to strand the astronauts irretrievably in space. Mattingly, having been left behind, proves to be a significant part of figuring out how to successfully power up the capsule and get the men back to earth.

During the film, there is a flashback to an interview with Jim Lovell. He tells the story of when he was a Navy carrier pilot and, while flying over the Pacific, his instruments failed; he was flying blind, and he was running out of fuel. It was dark everywhere; how could he see to land on the carrier?

That is when he saw a green trail in the ocean. It was the radiant glow of planktonic algae that the carrier's giant propeller had stirred up, leaving a glowing trail of the organisms' bioluminescence in its wake. Lovell could never have seen that pale glow if his instruments had not failed, yet that was what showed him the way to safety.

In both instances, a "bad" thing proved to be what was needed to save the situation, and the turnaround came pretty quickly. It doesn't always work out that way.

In Genesis, we have the story of Joseph, Jacob's favorite son, who his brothers so hate that they conspire to kill him, but instead, they sell him into slavery in Egypt. A truly terrible thing that ultimately led to the salvation of Joseph's family and thousands of others during a famine. But this turnaround took 22 years, 13 of which saw Joseph in prison before he was reunited with his family.

Joseph explains to his family that "God sent me before you to preserve life. The famine has been in the land these two years; and there are five more years in which there will be neither plowing nor harvest. God sent me before you to preserve for you a remnant on earth, and to keep alive for you many survivors. So, it was not you who sent me here, but God; he has made me a father to Pharaoh, and lord of all his house and ruler over all the land of Egypt." (Gen. 45:5b-8)

We've had two strange and challenging years with the pandemic, which is clearly a bad thing. No one knows what this year will bring nor what "normal" will look like in the future. What I do know is that the God of the Bible, the God we worship, loves us and is always for us. We don't set a timetable, but we can trust that the God who comes to us with hope, peace, joy, and love will redeem his creation in the perfect way and at the ideal time. Let us begin this new year in confident faith and trust in God and God's plan for his creation.

We are collecting food and supplies for the micro pantry that is still in the works. We hope to have it soon.


The nominating committee is still looking for two more volunteers to serve on this committee. Our job is to look at members of the church who would be willing to serve as elders or


Attention Church Members:
